




nel, who died on Monday morning at 11 o'clock, Stonycreok township loses of its oldest and most prominent citizen. Mr. Kimmel was born May 22, 1824 and was aged 79 years, 6 mos., 29 days. He was a softerer with dropsy for about six months and at times was confined to his bed with the terrible malady, for several weeks prior to his death he was in a very feeble condition and his death was looked for every moment.

Mr. Kimmel was a life long resident of Stonycreek, being born on the farm now owned by J. J. Kimme! After he was married he moved onto the farm on which he lived until four years ago at which time he sold the property to Edward B. Kimmel and moved to Downey. He was a prominent citizen of the community in which he lived and was respected and honored by the entire countryside. Mr. Kimmel is survived by the widow and two brothers, . J J. Kimmel of Berlin and John M. Kimmel of Jefferson township. Three sons also mourn the death of the aged father, Rev. J. L. Kimmel of Dayton. Ohio, J. G. and Edward B. Kimmel of Stonycreek township.


The deceased was a consistent and faithful member of the Bretbren church and took a leading part in the workings of his church during the years in which he enjoyed good health. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock at Downey, Rev. J. H. Knepper officiated. Dec 21, 1903



The machinery of the shoe plant arrived Toesday, and Wednesday men and teams transferred the same from cars to the pulley works building in which the plant is to be installed. Messrs. H. H. Weierbach and foreman H. H. Hart also arrived Tuesday and are superintending the erection of the plant in its new location. As soon as the machinery is mostly in position Mr. Weierbach will return to Philadelphia to lay in a supply of leather and other raw material and to engage about a dozen skilled laborers to come to Berlin and work in the plant. Mrs. Hart accompanied her husband H. H. Hart to this place.

THE SHOE FACTORY

The shoe factory that operated out of the Eclipse Pulley Works building (beginning in 1903) was a short-lived venture as far as we can determine. According to our history book *The Berlin Area 1777-1977* the shoe factory closed in 1905.
