# SUSIE (MARUSCHOK) PETRO SHARED RUSSIAN ORTHODOX CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

usie Petro shared Christmas holiday traditions from the Russian Orthodox faith at the home of Samuel and Julie (Blubaugh) Petro during the Pious Spring Women's Club home tour on November 11 and 12. The Petro home and surrounding acres is located in the same area where the village of Shaft existed during the coal-mining years of the early 1900s. Susie is the widow of John Petro. John was a brother of Joseph Petro, the father of Samuel Petro.

Joe Petro, who is married to the former Betty Lou Brady, is the last surviving child of the 11 children born into the family of Wasco (Vassily Petrov) and Anastasia "Elsie" (Ditchko) Petro, long-time residents of the Shaft coal mining patch. Wasco was born in Lutroviscia, Austria-Hungary while Elsie was born in Helshki, Austria-Hungary. The met in the Berlin area and were married in Goodtown on September 18, 1916.

As tour participant gathered around Susie's table setting showcasing Russian Orthodox traditions, Susie highlighted customs still observed by the Petro family. Susie shared about her Maruschock parents living in Goodtown before eventually moving on to the Central City area for mining employment. Susie and her husband, John Petro and other siblings of John resided in the Washington, D.C. area for employment. Susie returned to Central City for her retirement years and is an aunt (by marriage) to Samuel Petro.


**GEORGE MYERS' STORE**
