

ROBERT VAN METER'S 5 & 10 CENT STORE

507 MAIN STREET BERLIN

obert G. Van Meter was a former merchant in Berlin. He operated Van Meter's 5 & 10 Cent Store from 1926 to 1931. Adolph G. Weyand originally opened the same store in 1924 with Robert G. Van Meter as store manager.

By 1926, Van Meter took over the store and operated it approximately five years longer. The store was located on Berlin's lower diamond in what today is the Lutheran House. Many will remember when the same building was the location of Berlin's A&P Grocery and later the Western Auto.

After 1931, Robert Van Meter and his wife. Nellie re-located to Winchester, Virginia where they were active with the Presbyterian Church. Robert Van Meter passed away on January 25, 1946 at the age of 62 at the Winchester Memorial Hospital.

Robert G. Van Meter, 62, former Berlin businessman, died January 25 at the Winchester, Va., Memorial hospital. He had been in failing health

since early in December.

For a brief period during the '20's, Mr. Van Meter operated a five-andstore on Berlin's lower cent ten diamond. He then moved to Winchester, where he was elected an elder of Loudoun street Presbyterian church. He also occupied a similar position of trust at Cedar Cliff Presbyterian church, where he taught a Sunday school class. He was elected delegate from the latter church to attend annual meetings of the Winchester Presbytery.

Surviving in addition to his wife, Mrs. Nellie (Dinges) Van Meter, Winchester, are two children: William, law student in George Washington university, Washington, D. C. and Mrs. Catherine Pederson, also of Washing-
