SAMUEL STAHL'S MONUMENT IN THE QUEER FAMILY CEMETERY

THE QUEER FAMILY CEMETERY

SAMUEL STAHL (1838 – 1865) WAS A CIVIL WAR SOLDIER. His actual burial location is in the Poplar Grove National Cemetery, Petersburg, VA. He was a member of Co. E 93rd PA Vol. Army. (USGenWeb says he was buried at Gettysburg, PA.) His wife was Phebe Queer Stahl (1832-1921) a daughter of Jacob and Eve (Hoover) Queer. The 1930's WPA Survey stated that she is in an unmarked grave in the Queer Family Cemetery.

Leading Marshall Dickey and David R. Hay to the isolated location of the Queer family cemetery was Michael Klink, Sr. who lives along the Garrett Shortcut and is familiar through hunting with the location of the Queer family cemetery. Marshall Dickey has ancestors buried in the overgrown cemetery.
