## BARN RAISING AT MANCE IN NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP



### NEW BARN AT THE JESSE AND MALINDA (FISHER) YODER FARM

In February 2023 the Amish community held a barn raising in the Mance area of Northampton Township to construct a new barn for Jesse and Malinda Yoder on the farm they purchased in 2022. The Old Order family, formerly of the Pocahontas area, are owners of the former farm that in the 1950s and later decades was known as Leora Alverda (Felker) Deist's farm. Leora was the widow of William Henry Deist.

After Leora's passing in 1987, the farm passed into the ownership of her son-in-law and daughter, Carl Leroy "Smitty" and Joan Marlene Smith and Leora's daughter, Edna J. Deist. During that trio's ownership a new home was constructed on the farm and the older house was eventually torn down. The farm was once a main portion of the old Daniel Bauman farm that also included the Bowman-Bauman cemetery. The Wills Creek flows through that glen in which the settlement of Mance developed along the railroad.

In more recent years after the passing between 2004 and 2010 of the Smiths and Edna Deist, their "Wills Creek Farm" passed into the ownership of Stacey Bingaman of Ellerslie, Maryland. During her ownership the older dairy barn on that Mance farm was torn down and a large garage and an addition was added onto the house. Locals remember the huge bull that had been housed in that barn when it was owned by the Smith family and Edna.

The new barn constructed on the Jesse Yoder farm has been built over the same foundation where the older barn sat for a century of time.

### THE ALTAR AREA IN THE GLENCOE REFORMED CHURCH



The Glencoe Reformed Church was organized early in 1887. The same year the current house of worship was built with the cost being about \$2,500. The congregation was organized with about 30 members according to the statement of elder John T. Leydig.

### **RUTH (PRITTS) GILBERT**


