

## THE HAY'S MILL GRIST MILL



This framed picture of the former grist mill in the village of Hay's Mill has been donated by Kathy (Shockey) and Kent Schoffstall. The frame is actually constructed out of wood that came out of the mill when it was dismantled in the 1930s during the time period when it was owned by the late Homer P. Boger. Kathy is the granddaughter of Homer and Sadie (Swearman) Boger, who had this picture hanging for many years in their television room in the historic stone home that was built for Pioneer Simon HöH (1742-1842) who immigrated from Gerhardsbrunn, Germany.


## BOOKSHELF DONATED BY THE DANIEL HAY ESTATE


#### **ADDITIONAL DONATIONS**
