

"The Heffley House"

This is the Heffley house which is named for the family that settled here and built this home in the early 1800's. The Heffley family also owned the hardware store adjacent to this property. Marie Heffley was the daughter of Robert and Wilhelmina (Floto) Heffley. She lived in this house most of her life. Marie married Dalton Beachley who was a farmer, timberman, and coal operator in Brothersvalley Twp. They raised two sons, Robert and John. Dalton passed away in 1969 at the age of 77, while Marie remained in her home until her death in 1980 at the age of 85.

One story they shared about her family when Marie was growing up was that they liked to make homemade ice cream, and when the ice cream was ready, they would light a lantern and hang it out on the front porch. That was to tell the people the ice cream was ready, so people would stop for some ice cream. I bet the children loved that! That's what you call being very generous. We could all learn something from the Heffley's, to always be kind!

At the July 12, 2022 monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Berlin Area Historical Society, John Long presented this display board. It was a joint effort between John and his wife, Eloise Long to showcase history associated with the society's Heritage Haus.

The display features pictures of Dalton and Marie (Heffley) Beachley, former owners of the former Heffley House. Once the Beachley family sold the historical home to BAHS, it was renamed the Heritage Haus. Marie was the daughter of Robert and Wilhelmina (Floto) Heffley, long-time owners and operators of the adjoining Heffley Hardware. Marie lived in this house most of her life. Marie married Dalton Beachley, who was a farmer, timberman, and coal operator in Brothersvalley Township. The reading – centered in the display – shares Interesting history about the Beachley and Heffley families. Ken and Carol Miller plan to hang this display in the Heritage Haus near the lantern, which was hung on the front porch of the Heffley home when homemade ice cream was available to the community.
