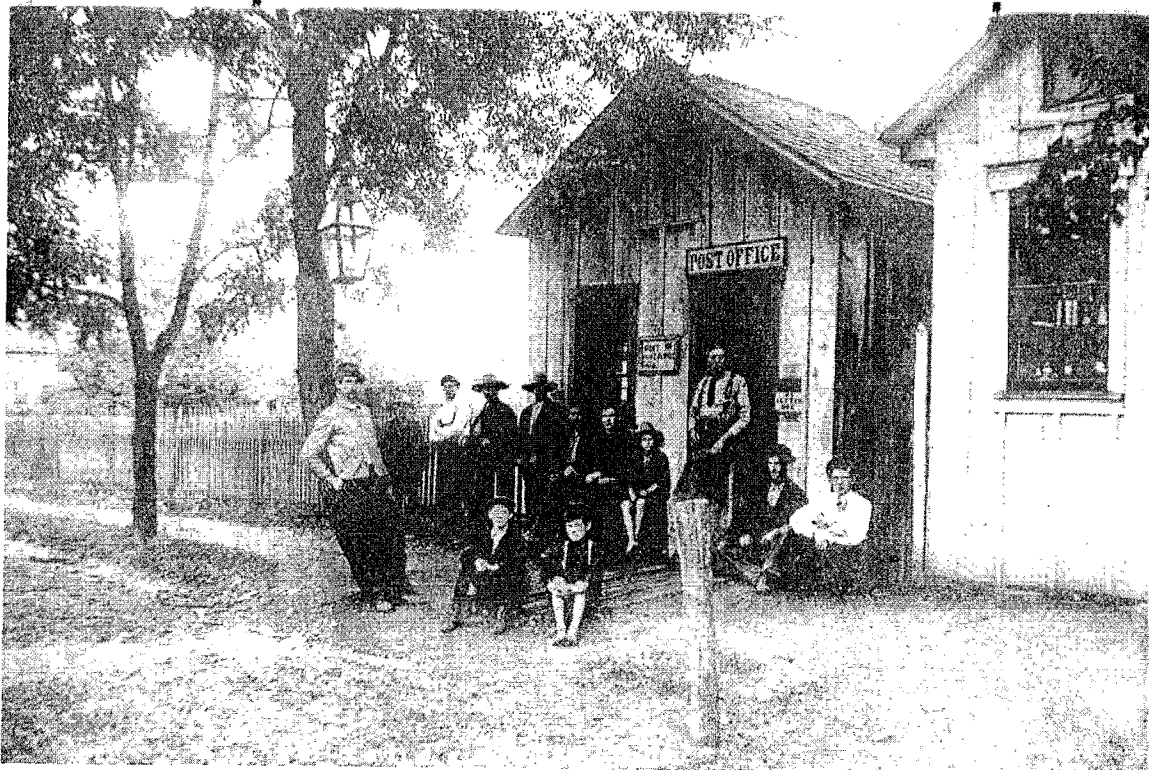

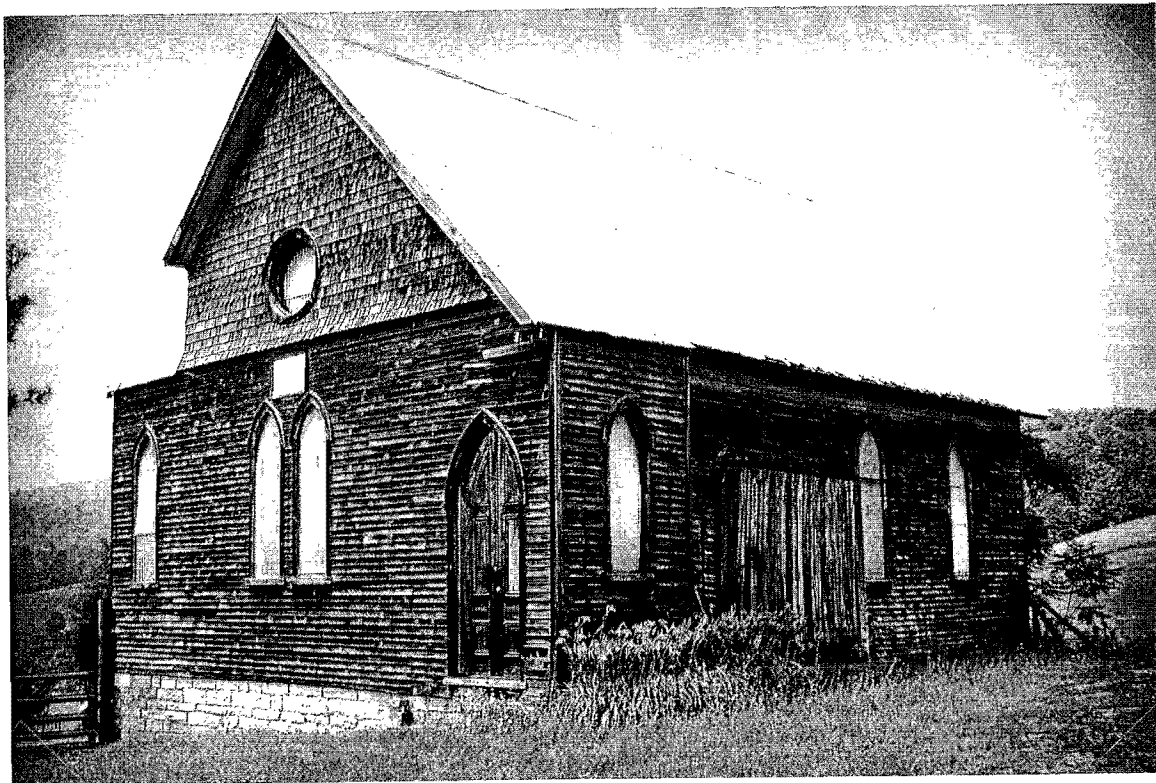

THE FORMER MT. ZION REFORMED CHURCH



Fred Bittner captured the above picture of the former Mt. Zion Reformed Church at the southern edges of the Mt. Zion Cemetery in Allegheny Township. In recent decades the former church edifice has been used as a storage facility for the Lee and Lorene Hoppert family farm. The Mt. Zion Reformed Church was built in 1892. The 122-year-old structure was considered a modern church edifice for its time period with stained glass windows and a furnace. The congregation was affiliated with the Bedford County Reformed Churches, with the ministers coming from Bedford County.

During the years between 1920 and 1925 the congregation met with financial difficulties during the pastorate of the Rev. George Ely. The rustic church building was sold to James Tipton and the land was returned to the James Tipton farm from whom the congregation acquired the site for the construction of their house of worship. Lorene (Powell) Hoppert was a granddaughter of James Tipton. Lee and Lorene Hoppert raised their three children: Lynn, Charlene Norris, and Donna on the same James Tipton family farm at Mt. Zion.
